This global conference provided a perfect platform for Canada to share its proactive approach, and Ken was enthusiastic about making the most of it. He seized every opportunity to expand his knowledge, connect with experts, and proudly showcase Canada's commitment to the HIV response.

"I had the opportunity to meet countless influential figures and international leaders in the HIV sector," recalls Ken. "Each conversation presented fresh opportunities for advocacy and new ways to enhance CAS's efforts to create impactful, sustainable change for Canadians living with HIV."

Ken was especially proud that Randy, Communications Manager at CAS, had the opportunity to present their work at the Canada Pavilion. Randy's presentation highlighted the meaningful initiatives that CAS is driving, and the feedback was overwhelmingly positive. This exposure boosted CAS's visibility and opened doors for new partnerships and potential projects. The audience's engagement emphasized the alobal relevance of CAS's work and underscored the value of community-led approaches.

The conference also sparked Ken's interest in future opportunities for CAS to be involved in more research-focused AIDS conferences. This new
